The original versions and Grid versions are reproduced below:

Luke 15:4-7

AD30 ish: If any of you has a hundred sheep, and one of them gets lost, what will you do? Won't you leave the ninety-nine in the field and go look for the lost sheep until you find it? And when you find it, you will be so glad that you will put it on your shoulder and carry it home. Then you will call in your friends and neighbours and say, "Let's celebrate! AD2019 ish: An employer has 100 people working for him. One day, only 99 arrive for work, so the boss leaves work and goes to his house to make sure he is OK. When he finds out that he just overslept, he is happy and goes in for a chat and cup of tea. He says "I am so happy that my employee is not sick or injured, as I had feared, Let's celebrate!"

Harvest - what harvest?

Gerard Manley Hopkins, the late Victorian religious poet, commenced one of his most powerful poems "Hurrahing in Harvest" with the words "Summer ends now!"

For him summer ended then because the cornfields were being cut and the corn being placed in stooks. The latter not a word we use often today, for arable techniques have changed several times since then.

Radio 4 informed me that 1st September was the first day of calendar autumn but, astronomically, it is the first day after the equinox, 22nd September.

For all of us, autumn and harvest will mean different things - all significant in our own experience.

It used to be that autumn started the day when, as a choir boy in our North Staffordshire parish church, the final evening harvest service ended and we were all given an apple (fruit not phone). As a circuit Methodist minister in North LincoInshire, one year I had 26 different harvest services in schools, chapels, village groups etc belonging to the eight villages I covered! That definitely felt like the end of summer. Now it is when the last cobs of sweet corn will be gathered from the allotment.

Whatever - the year's harvest is not only a process of gathering, but the event and fact of having been harvested.

Jeremiah said to the people of Israel "Summer is past and we are not yet saved."

The scriptures tell us that God's plan and purpose is that we all might be "safely gathered in" into God's final harvest, by accepting His Son, and as Manley Hopkins reminds us in the same poem, "Down all that glory in the heavens to glean our Saviour." He who alone, as Jesus the Christ, is God's harvester.

A film review? "Risen"

Yes, not a book review, but a film review. It came about after I had finished a few things on the farm, had a shower, and was relaxing in the front room and noticed in the television listings this film, "Risen", and the quote that caught my eye was, "A Tribune is sent to find the body of Jesus after the resurrection"!

I noted that there was only twenty minutes to half an hour to run, but I turned on to see it. What I saw impressed me, so I watched out for its repeat, as with "Freeview" it is usually on the following week, which it was and set the recorder.

"Risen" turned out to be, in my opinion, very good. Not a typical, "Gung Ho" Hollywood travesty, but a film, I believe made in Spain, with only three actors that I knew, Joseph Fiennes (Shakespeare in Love) as the Tribune, Clavius; Tom Felton, (Draco Malfoy in the Harry Potter films) as Lucius; Peter Firth (Spooks) as Pilate.

Jesus, (Yeshua ~ Joshua as used in the film), was played by a New Zealander, Cliff Curtis, who has roots as a Maori, and part of the Ngati Hauiti and Te Arawa Tribes. I note this to say it's the first person I have seen, in films, who I think, could look like Jesus! (Not the usual blue eyed, brown haired European!)

"Risen" starts with the Tribune quelling a violent disturbance, thinking his work is done, heads home. Where Pilate has one last task for him: to oversee the end of a crucifixion and ensure the crucified are dead and there's no further problems - as it seems Caesar is due for a visit!

The task is done, but later the Sanhedrin want the tomb sealed, remembering the prophecy of the now dead Nazarene. This is also done.

On the third day the tomb is found empty, the stone looks blown away, and the guards gone. Clavius is ordered to find the body, and sets out to do so, upsetting a lot of people, Pilate included.


On one raid he follows Mary into the house, where he finds the disciples and Jesus! Jesus disappears, and the disciples, remembering His words set out for Galilee, along with the Tribune.

Pilate, thinking he has been betrayed by the Tribune, send out a squad led by Lucius to find Jesus and the Tribune. At Galilee, they meet Jesus again, as per the story in John of the catch of fish and the breakfast by the lake. The Tribune is full of questions and talks to Jesus over what he has seen, and it ends with Jesus talking to Peter and leaving this world.

I found it a most absorbing portrayal of this part of Jesus' life and that of the disciples. Scripture, where used, was fairly accurate. The only concern I had, was when the Tribune was examining the interior of the tomb, the shroud looked too much like the one in Turin, and I did wonder whether the reigning Caesar ever did visit Israel. Otherwise, I felt I could and have shared it with Christian folk that I know.

I recommend it to you all, keep and eye out for it, and once you have seen it would welcome your views.

A Place to Visit: Bethesda Chapel, Hanley

We first heard of Bethesda in 2003 when it was featured on the BBC programme 'Restoration'. It had lain neglected for several years and was consequently in a terrible state with a leaking roof and had been badly vandalised. The chapel came first in the Midlands public vote to win new funding, but nationally was pipped to the post by the Victoria Baths in Manchester.

Like most people we switched the telly off and rather forgot about it.

Then this year the chapel popped up on the list of places available to visit during the annual Heritage Open Days in September.

How much has happened since that 2003 programme? Lots: the chapel has been supported by the Historic Chapels Trust and English Heritage. The roof is now sound and the interior is beginning to be restored. Concerts and exhibitions are now held there.

When you walk in, the scale of the Chapel amazes you. Built in 1797 by the breakaway New Connexion, it could apparently seat 3000 people at its height. Standing in the pulpit quite literally took your breath away as you looked around at the huge number of balcony seats – and you thought of all the people who had preached there.

The volunteers were very friendly and welcoming, happy to share not just the history of the Chapel but also their own experience of being in the congregation many years ago. There was also a fascinating display about how the young men of the Chapel were involved in the First World War. Their stories were told and there were original letters from the chapel to the men at the front.

Overall, this was an incredible place to visit. A sense of place and a sense of faith. There are Open Days throughout the year – details on their website http://www.bethesda-stoke.info/

Mission Matters: Yeldall Manor

Yeldall Manor is a residential rehabilitation centre near Reading, in Berkshire. Since 1977, it has been helping men overcome drug and alcohol addictions and return to society to live new lives - drug, alcohol and crime-free.

Many lost jobs and families because of their addiction and, although they tried to stop, the withdrawal symptoms were so severe that their past efforts failed.

During the two-part programme, residents find a place where the staff and other residents welcome and accept them. They try to be like a family and, like good parents, offer both love and discipline.

Work is an important part of the main Yeldall Manor



programme – helping in the grounds, on maintenance of the house or in the kitchen.

Counselling and group sessions help residents face up to problems in their lives, which have often been 'hidden' by the drinking or drug-taking: many suffered childhood abuse or other traumas which need to be gently addressed.

Above all, Yeldall believes that the best means of achieving true freedom from addiction is by rehabilitation through Christian discipleship to Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord. They never insist on such a commitment, but pray that all residents will make this commitment for themselves and follow God's ways when they leave.

Here is a recent testimony from a former resident:

Tony shared:

"I came to Yeldall broken and trapped, exhausted from living a life of fear. Fear of loss, fear of rejection, fear of what people thought of me and fear of being alone... I had no hope, no faith and no trust in God, myself or anyone else.

"The hurt I experienced as a child from losing my dad was really difficult to deal with and created a perception that I had no power or love in my life. Drugs, alcohol and crime filled the void inside me. Filling this void became my obsession: I became selfish and self-centred to the core, doing and becoming everything I thought I'd never be. I walked further into hell and took my family with me. The cycle of using continued, trying to mask the guilt and shame of who I'd become...

"Through coming to Yeldall, I've managed to appreciate and accept love and grace, from when Helen came to visit me in prison, to being offered a place through Bursary funding. It's been an unforgettable year of transformation. The relationship I have with God and the Word is developing: it has come to life for me, living and breathing. It's a miracle how much has been healed and restored in such a short time: relationships, family, opportunities and, through the story of my transformation and God's grace, the judge who sentenced me has now been moved to help other people.

"I thank God for the hearts of everyone involved with the place, especially the discipleship of Joseph, my counsellor Becky, Richard and many more. People have really gone the extra mile to help and support me. I hope to carry a piece of this place and what I've learned in my heart as I move forward. Thank you, God, and thank you, Yeldall Manor."
