

On 28th March I had the honour of taking part in the service of thanksgiving for Paul. Whilst personally, and for all present, it was a time of sadness, in realising what we had lost in Paul's passing, it was also a time of thanking God for the privilege of having known Paul in our lives.

In brief, Paul had a strong Christian faith and devoted much of his time supporting the fellowship here in Ashbourne. He gave his time generously: he was a steward, then became Senior Steward, a Pastoral Visitor, and looked after the finances of the church very competently as Treasurer for many years.

Paul, I believe, was absolutely "one of the good guys", and there were many aspects to him. Many will remember Paul as a very convivial host, often sharing his love of red wine with guests. Paul had a quick smile and a ready chuckle, to accompany his dry sense of humour. Whilst Paul had many achievements, he didn't take himself seriously, but warmly encouraged those around him.

Paul was also a great family man. He and Wendy were a fantastic team doing so much for those around them. They also brought two boys into the world, encouraged and nurtured them into two fine young men. They were most pleased when Edward married and they were joined in their family by a lovely daughter in law, Heather.

I believe the following passage in Micah 6 in the Message sums up well how Paul lived:

"But he's already made it plain how to live, what to do, what God is looking for in men and women. It's quite simple: do what is fair and just to your neighbour, be compassionate and loyal in your love, and don't take yourself too seriously— take God seriously."

For many years Ashbourne Methodist Church has worked with our friends at other churches in the town to 'give, act, pray' with Christian Aid during Christian Aid week and during the Tissington Well Dressings. The last two years have been a little different, where we've tried new approaches to our fundraising, so this year we'll be taking the best ideas from past and present! Here's how you can get involved:

- Can you help to deliver donation envelopes to the houses of Ashbourne during Christian Aid week which is 15th-21st May. We aim to deliver an envelope to every house this year, including the new estates, to enable everyone to give if they would like to.
- Can you offer your letterbox as a drop-off point for envelopes? You'll
 get a small poster to display by your front door, and we'll put a sticker
 on each envelope to tell people where their local drop-off point is. We
 aim to have one letterbox for every small area. We'll collect the
 envelopes from you at the end of the week for counting. If you live in
 a village and would like to deliver around your village, please let us
 know.
- There will be envelopes available in Church for personal donations on Sunday 15th and Sunday 22nd May or you can give online at <u>www.tinyurl.com/AshCA22</u>
- Can you bake something for the cake stall at Tissington Well
 Dressings. This is from 26th-29th May. We normally sell about 800
 pieces of cake over the four day period, so we need lots of bakers!
 Please let us know what day you can bake for and how many
 portions, and we'll let you know the drop-off location in Ashbourne.
- Can you help to sell the cakes in Tissington? We have 2 hour slots available between 10am and 4pm on each of the 4 days. It's a lovely event and before/after you might like to walk around the village and see the wells.
- Can you pray for the work of Christian Aid? We ask for your prayers for our local fundraising, and for the work of Christian Aid as they support the most vulnerable people and campaign for a fairer world.

HUGH BOURNE 250th Anniversary

Hugh Bourne, one of the founders of Primitive Methodism, was born on 3rd April 1772 at Ford Hayes Farm in North Staffordshire.

Therefore 2022 is being commemorated as the 250th anniversary of the birth of this remarkable man.

Hugh remained based in North Staffordshire for his ministerial activity, whereas William Clowes, the other

founder of Primitive Methodism, based himself in Hull.



For us in the Ashbourne Circuit, Bourne was especially involved with the Weaver villages of Ramsor, Wootton and Ellastone. It was at Wootton that he met, was impressed with, and later cooperated with Elizabeth Evans, the Wesleyan lady preacher characterised in George Eliot's novel 'Adam Bede.'

There are a number of events taking place:

- The Cloud chapel at Rushton Spencer (the oldest Primitive Methodist chapel in continuous use) is open on Sundays 8th, 15th, and 22nd May from 1-4 pm.
- A Hugh Bourne walk is being organised on the afternoon of Saturday 7th May from the Cloud, to reflect the labours of Hugh Bourne in that neighbourhood.
- There is a two day conference organised at Mow Cop for Friday and Saturday 27th and 28th May, with a Camp Meeting at Mow Cop on the afternoon Sunday 29th May.

The Museum of Primitive Methodism at Englesea Brook (an idyllic rural setting) is open from April - see website for details: https://engleseabrook.org.uk).

On Saturdays, 25th June, 16th July, 10th September, 14th October, Sue and I will be the volunteers ensuring the museum will be open. We would be happy to welcome anyone from the circuit.

Not only us personally, but the weather too, having had a spell of lovely warm weather, and almost thinking it was May/June, till one looked at the trees and hedgerow which are still denuded of leaves - and then, within a day or so, wading through a blizzard or two as we fed the animals on the farm!

Life, both personal and of nature, has thrown a lot this way recently, but I suppose it's just life - the life we lead, the path we tread. Its ups, and its downs, it's a winding road and an ever-changing view. In all of it, whatever it throws at me, I thank God for my faith, the faith that faces the loss of dear friends, the faith that helps me in the warmth of the sun and in the blizzard too!



This beautiful island is a special place in the Inner Hebrides. It is a place of great Christian heritage and contemporary mission which has recently been visited by Ruth Mallard, and also by Stephanie and Geof Cole, as part of a local group.

Other readers have visited in the past (including the editors!) and others are planning to go this year.

We can have pilgrimages at home or away just by having a focus and taking time out from routine. We were fortunate to be able to have ours in this lovely location, staying at Bishop's House. The view from my little bedroom window across the sea to Mull was wonderful in itself!

Our time was very flexible - we had opportunities to walk and visit sites, including Staffa, with its huge basalt columns like the Giant's Causeway, and Tobermory with its coloured houses around the bay on Mull. Also times to be quiet, worship in the little chapel or the Abbey, to pray on a hilltop, beach, or have social times with others and enjoy the hospitality of the accommodation were all available. Some pursued their art or craft interests.

The quiet of the island, with few visitors as it was early in the season, was a bonus. We enjoyed many days of beautiful sunny weather, turquoise seas, white sands and all the natural beauty of springtime – lambs and daffodils, of course. The scenery was stunning and inspirational, as anyone who has visited the Scottish Highlands and Islands will confirm.

Some reflections on this pilgrimage:

- Imagination for what it must have been like in ages before Saint Columba arrived on the island, and what life and community was like in ancient times.
- Oneness with each other as a group together visiting this special place, reflecting on our oneness with God and ourselves.
- Nature was profoundly beautiful in the many shades of clear, bright sea blue, white sands, bays, hills and birdlife especially.
- Acceptance of who we are and where we are in life. Here, the Abbey life is also very much about accepting and reaching out in God-given ways to the world – its people and the environment. It has an attraction for pilgrims ancient and modern.


I appreciated a couple of the natural labyrinths that had been made on beaches. One was made with seaweed, another with stones. I feel it is all about journeying in our faith, whether we are at home or away.

A phrase that sums up this lona experience:

"Remoteness and connectedness".

Our visit to Iona was a memorable experience. The island greeted us with sunshine and blue skies as we stepped off the Caledonian MacBrayne ferry at the start of our island pilgrimage. The Hebridean islands share an unhurried lifestyle and sheer beauty of nature, but Iona has a special sense of peace and reflection – a place to be still with God. George Macleod, the founder of the Iona Community, described Iona as "... a thin place where only tissue paper separates the material from the spiritual."



We started our pilgrimage in the Abbey, a restored Benedictine monastery founded on the site where St Columba is said to have built the first church on Iona in 563AD. The church/monastery had a turbulent history until its final restoration in the twentieth century. The current Abbey building dates only from the last century, a beautiful but simple building with a sense that centuries of worship have taken place on that site and where the presence of God is almost tangible.

Many of the pilgrimage stations are accessible by track but some involved crossing open moor and some scrambling. As we journeyed around the island, the pilgrimage stations of Celtic crosses, of chapels, graveyards, hermit cells, hills and coasts invited reflection. Tramping across the moors to the more remote stations the peace and beauty of the island was evident.

Thanks to a chance conversation early last year, we had been able to join St Oswald's pilgrimage group. We stayed in the Bishop's House, a retreat house belonging to the Scottish Episcopal Church, enjoying the fellowship of our fellow travellers. Having travelled so far from home, the group took advantage of a boat trip to Staffa, where we landed to walk along the cliff face to the majestic Fingal's Cave – quite an adventure on the slippery basalt rock, but well worth it.

lona did not want us to leave. After days of sunshine, there was a gale the night before we left and a small risk that the ferry would not run. However the ferry did run and, after arriving in sunshine, we left in rain for our journey home.

In Cornerstone, over the next six weeks, we will be fitting a new kitchen, as well as upgrading the three inside rooms and creating some outdoor seating on the 'patio' area adjacent to Station Road, which will be accessed via Cornerstone. This will provide a beautiful sunny spot in which to share food and drink and we hope it will be very popular.

For those who want to know more, we will be arranging some meetings in May where we will share more of what we are planning, the roles we have available for volunteers.

THE LINK DEVELOPMENT PROJECT AND FUNDRAISING UPDATE

The big development this month is that our Link Development Project is a key part of the Derbyshire Dales District Council bid for substantial government Levelling-Up funding.

We have been working with the Ashbourne Town Team, over the last few months, to make links to their two other main projects: traffic management and improving the town's public open spaces. Together, the three projects address the Government criteria of regenerating the town centre, improving both the traffic situation and community and cultural facilities.

The District Council Community and Environment Committee on 6th April decided to back the Ashbourne Strategy, rather than a Matlock alternative, because it met the Government's requirements better and its projects are more fully developed. The bid also had the necessary support of the MP for Derbyshire Dales.

Over the next 2-3 months, we will be working with District Council consultants to fully develop the bid. This will focus on ensuring each of the projects gives value for money, improves footfall (visitors to the town), economic activity in the town and expanding community and cultural activity.

The Link project makes a big contribution to increasing Ashbourne Methodist Church's existing high levels of visitors (to The Cornerstone, Gateway and events and activities on our premises). The main project elements are the provision of a community hub and extended opening of the Cornerstone café, the provision of a 350-seat performance venue, full access for all to activities in all our buildings, additional meeting spaces and the upgrading throughout of our heritage-listed buildings.

One of the features of the Ashbourne Strategy is improving the routes across the town for pedestrians and cyclists, both through the built-up area and along the more open southern side of Henmore Brook. This will improve the access to all the town's existing and new facilities and enable easy access to the Tissington trail and the Peak District.

While the church members' contributions and planned fund raising (currently standing at £947,000) will allow the early phases of the project to be achieved, securing Government funding for the project would also enable the whole project to complete much earlier and also for a number of additional improvements to be achieved.

Once the bid has been finalised and approved by the District Council in June, it will go forward to the national competition for funds to be evaluated by the Government. It is anticipated that the outcome will be decided in the autumn. If successful, the full scheme would be completed by 2025.

Albert Shakesby was a rough, tough prize fighter in Hull in the early years of the 20th century. He gave an account of his life in a book published in 1910, 'From Street Arab to Evangelist-the life story of Albert Shakesby, a converted athlete.'

This tells how on January 9th, 1904, he went into the Great Thornton Street Primitive Methodist Chapel Hull with the intent of disturbing and stopping the meeting. On entering he felt constrained not to - and left. However he was compelled to return on January 13th, with the result that on that day, at 9.25 pm, he was on the penitent form. He said, 'he was no educated man, but I know the Lord has saved me.' He regarded the chapel as his spiritual birthplace.

Struggling to pass the Primitive Methodist examinations to be a local preacher, he was eventually engaged as a lay worker with much of his spectacular and fruitful evangelism in and around Hull.

Noted for his physical strength and powerful physique, he suffered a major injury whilst trying to catch a man who jumped from a building on fire in Beverley. It made him a cripple.

In May 1907 he was on crutches and leading a mission in Sileby Leicestershire. The superintendent minister encouraged him, and took Albert to the Centenary Camp meeting at Mow Cop. At a prayer meeting there, he was healed, threw his crutches away and returned with the superintendent minister to Sileby as a fully able bodied man - unsurprisingly to great effect.

The superintendent minister at Sileby was Rev Henry Land (1864-1934), the grandfather of our friend, Jacinth Land.
