

Dear Friends,

“The journey of Lent”

Most of March is taken up with Lent. From Shrovetide through to Easter, we shall journey from pancakes to Palm Crosses, from hot cross buns to a hillside crucifixion.



Symbols are very powerful. The symbols of Lent remind us, in an unspoken way, of the journey that takes us on from our “giving up” to Christ’s “giving all”!

Our churches are visible signs that the people there are journeying through the different seasons of the year. Some places of worship won’t have flowers on the altar until Easter; others will have a garden tomb displayed; some will have a cross outside, draped as appropriate near Easter, in purple cloth and crown of thorns, then a white cloth and adorned with flowers at Easter.

The visual impact of these is there for all to see. Greater, though, is the witness in our lives of the journey we are on. Do our lives show the nature of that journey and the God we travel with? Our pilgrimage through Lent is not just about the outward and visible signs that we cherish, but about what’s going on inside us.

So I hope and pray that through our worship and fellowship, Lenten courses and lunches, both publicly and privately, other people will see the journey we are on and enable us to invite them too, to reflect on the season of Lent – the offering of God’s love and forgiveness, friendship and grace.

May this Lenten season prepare us for the celebration of Easter this year.

All things will one day break, but not love.



On Saturday 2 March, Dr Jill Barber, Project Manager at Englesea Brook chapel and museum, will be the guest speaker at the morning only meeting at Ashbourne Road church in Derby. Her theme will be the 'Hidden Voices' of early Primitive Methodist women evangelists. Their stories are fascinating and generally little known, painstakingly researched by Jill.

Green Box

Toothbrushes (and their packaging), toothpaste tubes and lids(and their packaging).

The Strawberry Farm (who collect the crisp packets) also has a wheelie bin to collect the above; it will be collected by TerraCycle once full.

ALL MAKES of toothbrushes and toothpaste and their packaging can be accepted (toothpaste boxes now often have some shiny surfaces which means they cannot go in the normal Blue Bin collection). The heads of electric or battery toothbrushes can also be donated, but not the electrical parts.

There is a collection box for these items in Natural Choice health food shop. The more people who use this facility the better, so please spread the word!

BOOK AID

PROVIDING CHRISTIAN LITERATURE IN AREAS OF NEED

A big thank you to all who have contributed books to Book Aid over recent months and years. I hope to have another collection to make in the spring – ‘spring cleaning’ and all that! So if you want to start having a sort-out now....

To give you an idea what Book Aid is about I have reproduced below extracts from an email I received from them recently.

Changing times for Book Aid

I've recently taken over the leadership of Book Aid so allow me to introduce myself. I'm the eldest daughter of Bob and Ada Hiley and as part of the family I was aware, but only from a distance, that Book Aid must be facing some challenges with future leadership as my father just kept getting older! In 2014 I was working as a solicitor but increasingly felt the call of God on my life to lay that aside and make myself available for Book Aid. Thank you to all of you who have supported the mission of Book Aid through the years, and all who continue to do so now.

This is what Book Aid is all about

The focus originally was on Africa and the vision was to support Christian bookshops that were closing down at a rapid rate because of difficulties in their countries. The aim was to see a continuous supply of books to Christian bookshops which would then sell the books at locally affordable prices thereby helping to secure their continuation in these areas. The need for Christian books continues and our Container Partners particularly request BIBLES. Book Aid cannot supply enough. Especially sought after are the King James Version or New King James Version. If you have Bibles not being used we would love to have them to send abroad – good condition is preferred of course!

Book Aid Kenya Mission

Philomena Mulandi heads up the work of Book Aid Kenya Mission which came about from the 25th Anniversary vision of Book Aid UK in 2012. Since February 2016 Book Aid Kenya Mission is now a Container Partner of Book Aid UK in its own right. As well as the book house in Mombasa they have been blessed with a town centre shop on a well frequented mall in a prime Mombasa shopping area at a low rental.

Philomena reports that new laws passed recently mean that there is a huge demand for Bible study materials as anyone seeking to be a pastor must undertake Bible training. As Book Aid Kenya Mission develops pray with us for their safety and that they will continue to grow and flourish.

Challenges facing partners in Nigeria

Book Aid has a number of partners in Nigeria with whom we have worked closely for many years. Since January 2016 under the new President, economic changes in Nigeria have made life financially extremely difficult for our Partners. Many have been able in the past to send donations to support the work of Book Aid UK, but this has almost completely stopped due to the fall in the oil price and the government's restrictions on foreign exchange. A number of partners have explained how difficult life is financially and this has an ongoing effect on Book Aid.

Those who have been Book Aid Overseas Partners for some years have seen their shops built up to stability. By contrast we were so pleased to welcome as a Container Partner in 2015 Grace and Light under the leadership of Tassie Ghata working in the north of Nigeria. Grace and Light is an expanding ministry to people with AIDS. Tassie came to the London warehouse with one of Grace and Light's Trustees, Jo Ann Sweeney, in Feb 2016 to discuss the bookshop just built in their compound.

Tassie's plans are for bookshop staff to be recruited from some of the former AIDS patients to provide them with work and also to provide affordable Christian literature in the locality. The container that was sent in 2015 had met with numerous problems on arrival in Nigeria and had cost much money to release from the port. The container had been underwritten by George Verwer, founder of OM, and Book Aid is immensely grateful that George Verwer provided much needed financial support to achieve the result. Tassie told of the heartache and frustration involved in getting the container to its destination. However the quality of the books she saw on opening the container had overwhelmed her and filled her with relief. She was visiting Book Aid to

request a further container and to explain how having books in such good condition is so important.

Zimbabwe

A container sent with high hopes to SU Zimbabwe in January 2016 'hit a brick wall'. On arrival in Harare the container was impounded at the dock and placed in a bonded warehouse with a demand for US \$10,000 to be paid for release. Our partners did not have that money and the container continued to be locked away until, a year later, it was released! We and our container partners had spent a year praying for its release, unable to pay the tax imposed. Eventually we heard that they won their case against the company who agreed to allow the books to leave the port.

Container facts

- 322 containers have been sent abroad in 29 years.
- Up to 100,000 books per container
- Around 32 million books and Bibles have gone from the UK
- 4 pallets of Bibles packed per container
- Each container holds 20 pallets
- 604 boxes of Books/Bibles per container

Refugee crisis in Italy

In 2015 we received a plea from a pastor ministering to African refugees in a camp outside Rome. He was desperate for Bibles and asked if Book Aid could help. We were delighted to send him some boxes of Bibles just before Christmas 2015 and he wrote: 'We are happy to let you know that we received the boxes of bibles you sent to our ministry. It is in fact a tremendous blessing to our ministry.'

What next?

The big question currently for Book Aid is 'How should we continue this work?' Most importantly we desire to know the Lord's leading. Book Aid has known many, many good years. But like other mission groups times are challenging financially. For us, there are also logistical challenges in collecting across the entire UK. In spite of the many cutbacks made recently, humanly speaking it looks like strategic action is needed. These questions exercise the Director and Trustees. They are questions on the mind of the team too.

Pray with us for:

- Containers to reach our partners and arrive safely through customs.
- Wisdom and peace over decisions about the future
- For volunteers so we can process more books

Talking of God together.....

Our Monday evening housegroup recently followed the studies in a little book 'Talking of God Together' which is published by the Methodist Church. We found it a very useful resource, the idea of the book being that, if we become more confident to speak about our faith with each other in a small group, it becomes more natural to talk about our faith with others. Many times people might ask us: "Does God care about the hurting world? How do you know that God is listening? Have you ever heard God speaking?" It is not easy to answer these questions. The studies led us through thinking about various aspects of God: A Present God, A Listening God, A Caring God and A Speaking God.

I want to share with you the session 'A Speaking God'

We explored a variety of ways in which God speaks into our world today. We all experience God in different ways and these are the varied ways in which our group felt that we hear God speaking today:

- Through His word - the Bible is our inspiration and where we hear the voice of God through the ages
- Through His Son - hearing the words of God through the words and example of Jesus, we learn of God's love
- Through nature and creation - wondering at the intricacies and beauty of the world, God tells us of his care for the world
- Through other people - we often feel God speaking through the experiences and faith of others
- Through music - for some music and singing bring God's voice very close
- Through circumstances - through things that happen to us in life, good and bad, we may feel God's presence
- Through prayer - in prayer we try and listen for God to speak into our hearts

We certainly found this reflective study very encouraging and can recommend it to others. The book is available in Ashbourne Church Office to buy (£1.99) and can be used as a group or individually.

The conference will be held at Littleover Methodist Church from 10.00am until 4.00pm. All are welcome and should bring a packed lunch.


