

### “God in Love Unites Us”

The Methodist Church in Britain is part way through a consultation called ‘God in love unites us’, a report for



study and consultation on which all District Synods have been asked to vote this spring. The outcome will approve, disapprove, or approve with amendments some of the key resolutions of the Conference, namely:

- that the Conference adopts the understanding of the principles of good relating contained in the report
- that the Conference adopts the understanding of cohabitation contained in the report
- that the Conference adopts the Guidance on the Understanding of Marriage contained in the report and directs its inclusion in CPD
- that the Conference consents to the marriage of same-sex couples
- that the Conference amends the Standing Orders in the light of these decisions

The full text of the Report, the Study Guide and a helpful précis can be found in our churches. Details of our local consultations can be found in this edition of Connections (page 5). As we pray with and for one another during this process, we accept that we cannot always agree, but seek to witness to our unity as we live with contradictory convictions.

This debate is not just taking place within the Methodist Church in Britain. Both our ecumenical partners and our Methodist brothers and sisters overseas are also wrestling with these issues.

As the Secretary of Conference says: “These are difficult and for some painful times. However, we remain united in prayer for one another, convinced that there is more that holds us together than causes us to differ, and confident that by the guidance of the Holy Spirit we can find a way (both in Britain and throughout the world) to live together as a Methodist family rejoicing in our common Wesleyan heritage”.

Whatever your opinion, I hope you will feel enabled and empowered to share in the conversations.

## **“God in Love Unites Us”**

Tim’s letter this month is about the report considered last July by the Methodist Conference, regarding “Marriage and Relationships” (see page 2).

The Ashbourne Circuit has arranged two meetings to consider and discuss these proposals, as follows:

- Saturday 1st February, 10.00am - 12.30pm at Ashbourne
- Wednesday 12th February, 7.00pm - 9.30pm at Brailsford

The two meetings will be organised on the same lines and cover the same ground. The idea of holding two meetings is to give everyone who wishes to do so the opportunity to be involved. The Brailsford meeting is intended principally for chapels other than Ashbourne, but both meetings are open to all who find the time and place convenient.

Each meeting will start with an introduction which will outline the background to the Conference report: “God in Love Unites Us”.

For each part of the report there will be a brief introduction, outlining its content and the issues arising, and then discussion in small groups, with a number of questions to be considered. Each group will have a facilitator to guide the discussion and take a few notes.

### **Feedback**

At the end of the meeting, each participant will be given a feedback sheet on which to record their reactions. It is not intended these should be filled in immediately, rather that they should be taken away and considered prayerfully, and then returned later.

A summary of these views will be given to members of the Circuit who will attend the District Synod when it meets on Saturday 25th April.

We have stayed safe and well and reconnected with people we have met previously, and the bond with the young people at the hospice is stronger too. They were so excited to know Joy and Christian were coming back. The sense of “family”, enduring prayer and personal connection was emphasised by the co-ordinator.

Gifts to support the work are valued and immensely helpful but knowing the church family in another place cares and prays is the foundation. It would be good to extend the prayer support and if anyone or a home group is interested in being a prayer supporter please contact me and I will provide information to assist.

It is a long way to go to Kolkata and costs a lot of money. We all learnt such a lot from each other. New experiences and challenges in our faith journeys are important even if a bit daunting at times! It is great to know wherever we are God calls us and uses us if we listen and follow.

Maybe this message of thanks from someone at the Cathedral Relief Service will put the visit into context:

“Dearest Ruth, Joy and Christian,

Thank you immensely. We will pray for you and all the meaningful plans for the future. We are having rains now and the temperature in Kolkata is dipping each day. It must be freezing at your end.

**...and from Joy:**

I went to Kolkata in India on the 18th December (at 4:30am!) with my Mum and brother. We ran an educational Christmas holiday club programme for the children at the Sneyakunja Children's Home at the Arunima Hospice. These children have been affected by HIV/AIDS.

Due to the massive stigma of HIV/AIDS, they have often missed out on education, as they haven't always been allowed to go to school and experience lots of other things children should have access to. This children's home and hospice is run on donations as the government funding has been cut.

We met the Bishop of Kolkata a few times and were updated with the way things are run and visions for the future.

We also visited other projects within the slums like Pally Mangal (women's empowerment). This teaches marginalised women skills such as sewing and beauty care so they can earn money, support their families and develop dignity. The building was a tiny one with only room for the women to sit down on the floor upstairs. It wasn't tall enough for standing. The ladies were crowded in and very proud to show us what they had learnt.

Nari Dana is another city centre project for women, which produces high quality hand crafted items, providing employment when the women have qualified from the sewing courses.

These projects are all set up and run by the CRS (Cathedral Relief Service). CRS promotes and supports empowerment, education and health. It provides social care provisions in the most deprived areas of the city and some nearby villages.

Thank you to all who have been interested in our trip and the donations and support. It has been much appreciated.

This spectacular 27 feet high sculpture is made from around 100,000 bladed weapons collected in knife amnesties during police surrenders across the country. Relatives of those killed by knife crime were invited to engrave the blades with names and messages for their loved ones as part of the sculpture.

The Knife Angel has visited many cities in the UK and was at Derby Cathedral throughout most of October.

# Are you **passionate** about **people** & **planet** ?

The **Ashbourne One World Group** exists to raise awareness of world development issues by organising events and talks. We're part of Ashbourne Churches Together and, since we started in 1984, we've been organised a huge number of events:

- We were part of the successful Jubilee 2000 campaign for the cancellation of third world debt, which ultimately led to rich countries promising to write off US\$110bn of debt.
- 2004 saw llamas in Ashbourne town centre as people had the chance to walk with the llamas as well as find out more about South America!
- In 1986, our "Talking World" helped explain living conditions for people around the world.
- In 2019, we brought Phosphoros Theatre Company to Ashbourne to perform their hit play, "Pizza Shop Heroes", a show all about the experiences of child refugees.

Our plans for 2020 include Ashbourne's first "One World Festival", an exciting new event which will celebrate our links with the wider world, and an evening exploring whether we should be bothered about climate change.

The group also raises funds for Christian Aid through our cake stall at the Tissington Well Dressings, and have raised over £50,000 for the charity since 1984. Our cake stall this year will be on 21-25th May.

We are looking for people to get involved in the group – we're very friendly and we meet 3-4 times a year to plan our events.

## Asylum Seekers in Derbyshire

Those seeking asylum in the UK have experienced untold horrors in their home countries, fled their homes and travelled with great difficulty across the world to find safety here.

Host Derby provides temporary accommodation with volunteer hosts in their own homes, offering a lifeline for vulnerable individuals. Hosts are supported to welcome an individual in their home, from a few days to a few months. Guests are supported to access the right help and move on with their lives. All hosts receive training and are matched with the right person who needs their support. Each host family can decide how long they host people for, and how often they take a new guest.

Host Derby is run by Upbeat Communities, in partnership with The British Red Cross, Derby Refugee Advice Centre, Metropolitan Housing, Derby City Mission and Derby City of Sanctuary.

If you have space in your home and would like more information about whether this is something you could help with, we'd like to invite you to meet with Delphis from Host Derby on Wednesday 5th February at 7.00pm in The Cornerstone.

This has been arranged by the **Ashbourne One World Group** (part of Ashbourne Churches Together) who have been working with Upbeat Communities to help support the refugee families who are living in Ashbourne.

## Christmas Angels 2019

Some months ago, Craft & Chat decided to do Christmas Angels for a third and – for now! – final time in December 2020.

We were joined by lots of other people, including Ashbourne Churches Together, knitters from St Oswald's, from WI and of course people from our own church. (And yes, some people did crochet angels too!) The grand total was 1289 angels – all done to the same pattern but often turning out very individually and in different sizes.



A few days before putting the angels out in the town we held an 'Angels Blessing Service' led by Rev Maggie Rode. People from different contributing groups spoke very movingly about what knitting the angels has meant to them. One clear thread was that what often starts as a way to 'keep busy' whilst the telly

is on, often becomes much more meaningful and you begin to feel part of something bigger that God can use. People who took their knitting on holiday found that it opened up conversations with strangers about the knitting and the love and faith it seeks to share.

We woke up to heavy rain on the morning planned for putting out the angels. But we all duly turned up at the Cornerstone ('Angels HQ' for the morning!) and after tea and toast the rain had stopped. A whole range of people interacted with us and with the angels and many were just overwhelmed by it. There was a carer who took an angel for those they would see that day. Another was a paramedic who would put their angel in their cab when they were on duty over Christmas. One person was so desperate for an angel that they drove down to town in their pyjamas!

But overall we just prayed the angels on their way to homes where there would now be a visible symbol of God's love at Christmas.

Thank you to everyone who has encouraged us, prayed for the outreach, knitted, crocheted, tagged, made cups of tea – we couldn't do it without you!

## The Cornerstone 'Clock'

From time to time on social media we see old photographs of the building which we now call The Cornerstone. The building has had a variety of uses over the years, Labour Exchange and Driving Test Centre being amongst them. At one time it was due for demolition but was saved by its Listed Building status.

Over the last 20 years it has been used as a coffee shop - and so we get to the 'Clock'. All we see of a clock is its hands and face, we see nothing of the springs and cogs that are essential to make the hands go around, and that is the same as The Cornerstone.



When you enter the coffee shop you are instantly aware of the counter and of the two people who welcome you in, the 'Hands and Face'. Your attention may be drawn to the noises going on behind them, of people working in the background, making sandwiches and washing up, some of the 'Cogs'.

But there are many more 'Cogs and Springs' that you don't see. Volunteers who fold napkins, those who make the cakes, people who clean and those who do the laundry, people who organise rotas and those who prepare the accounts, those who do the shopping and those who collect stock from the wholesalers. And it goes on.

All of these 'Cogs' come together to make The Cornerstone work like 'Clockwork'. It is my privilege to say a big 'Thank You' to you all for all you do, because without you the 'Clock' would not work.

## **GREEN BOX**

### **REDUCE, RE-USE, RECYCLE - Single-use Plastic and Refills**

For a long time there has been much emphasis on Recycle, but we urgently need to come back to the first and most important part of the Reduce, Reuse, Recycle slogan - which is Reduce! This means changing the way we think and operate, but I feel we all need to make an effort. One of us won't make any difference, but millions of us will!

Single-use plastic may not seem a major part of the Climate Emergency to some, compared to fossil fuels, but it is certainly having a major impact on our oceans. Most of our plastic is sent abroad for recycling where they cannot cope with the volume. So we all have to find ways of not buying single-use plastic unless there really is no alternative.

One way is to take a container, plastic or otherwise, to be refilled - and there are a number of possibilities in Ashbourne.

**You can take a container of any size to be refilled at the following outlets:**

#### ***David Neill***

Washing-up liquid, All purpose cleaner, Laundry washing liquid and softener.

#### ***Natural Choice***

Wide variety of Herbs and Spices.

Washing-up liquid, Multi-surface cleaner, Floor cleaner, Bathroom cleaner, Bleach substitute, Laundry liquid and Softener. Shampoos, Conditioners, Body wash, Liquid hand soap.

#### ***The Cheddar Gorge***

Spices, Breakfast and Earl Grey teas, Coffee beans, Muesli, Penne, Chickpeas, Cannellini beans, Brown basmati rice, Self-raising white flour.

***Refills on the Road*** – a refill stall on the Thursday market.

Dried fruit, Nuts, Pasta and rice, Beans, grains and pulses, Cereals, Tea and coffee, Herbs and spices.

Household cleaners, Washing liquids, Soaps, Shampoos and Body wash.

## **Cheque fraud: Date your cheques “2020”**

How you date your cheques in 2020 could make you vulnerable to fraud.

That’s why some law enforcement agencies have warned consumers to include the full year - 2020 - when they take out their chequebooks and write a cheque. The same advice goes for other financial documents.

For example: when you write a cheque, you include the month, the day, and the year. You might abbreviate the date like this: “6/01/20.” That’s a short-hand way of writing “6th January, 2020.”

But here’s the problem: Fraudsters could easily change the year by adding two digits. For instance, the date “6/01/20” could be changed to “6/01/2021”.

The safer approach, according to the authorities, to dating the cheque would be to write out the full year “6/01/2020.” That way, fraudsters would have a harder time changing the year.

Is the risk of cheque-date fraud great? Probably not. But taking precautions now could save time and effort later if a fraud were to occur.
