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Dear Friends,

“Eggs and ashes”

The whole of this month sees us on a journey. From Shrovetide right through to Easter Day, we are on a journey from pancakes to Palm Crosses and from ashes to hot cross buns. These symbols remind us, in an unspoken way, of the journey which Lent takes us on. As we “give up”, we remember the one who “gave all”.



Our places of worship are filled with visible signs too, that we are on a journey together through a particular season of the Christian year. Many a church won't be having flowers on the altar until Easter; others will have a garden tomb displayed; some will have a cross, draped, as appropriate, near Easter in purple cloth and crown of thorns, then a white cloth, or adorned with flowers for Easter.

“God in Love Unites Us”

In February, two meetings were arranged by the Ashbourne Circuit to consider and discuss the report considered last July by the Methodist Conference, regarding “Marriage and Relationships”. These were attended by about 70 people in total.

At the end of these meetings, each participant was given a feedback sheet on which to record their reactions. A summary of these views will be given to members of the Circuit who will attend the District Synod when it meets on Saturday 25th April, and will be published in the April edition of *Connections*.

Discussion at the meetings reflected the differing views on the proposals expressed throughout the Methodist Church. The report itself acknowledges these differences and addresses the need to respect contradictory convictions:

According to Paul (Romans 14:1-15.7), when Christians hold opposing convictions on the same issues, all equally are accountable to God, each must act according to their conscience and none must behave in a way which damages or even destroys the faith of another. The summary in Romans 14:13 of Paul’s advice on how to live with contradictory convictions amongst the members of the body of Christ still stands: “Let us therefore no longer pass judgement on one another, but resolve instead never to put a stumbling block or hindrance in the way of one another”. (4.3.21)

Documents relating to this subject are still available: the Report of the Task Group, which was commended by the Methodist Conference, and an unofficial précis which is intended to be a fair summary of the report. In case of difficulty, please contact: dysters@tiscali.co.uk or 344086.

Everyone is equal in the sight of God. Yet we live in a world where poverty still persists. Poverty is an outrage against humanity. It robs people of their dignity and lets injustice thrive. But together we have the power to transform lives.

For over 70 years, Christian Aid has been standing with the poorest of our neighbours. We work in 37 countries, with people of all faiths and none, to stand up for dignity, equality and justice.

Together we can create a world where everyone can live a full life, free from poverty. Our voices and actions are stronger together. And with your help, we can make an even bigger difference.

Ashbourne Churches Together have been supporting Christian Aid for many years, through a cake stall at the Tissington Well Dressings and a door-to-door collection during Christian Aid Week.

We need help with both of these again this year. We need someone to take delivery of cakes during the period of the well dressings, and liaise with the volunteer bakers to make sure we have enough for each day. The Well Dressings are 21st-25th May.

We also need door-to-door collectors for Christian Aid week which is 12th-18th May. Some people find this task easy and enjoy meeting people who have their envelope ready and are grateful for the opportunity to give. Others find it more difficult but go out of their comfort zone to do it. We generally raise around £2,000 which is more than we could raise from any other event, so it's well worth it.

Tissington Well Dressings

Thursday 21st May – Monday 25th May



Each year the ACT One World Group organises a stall at the Tissington Well Dressings. We sell slices of cake to the visitors and some Traidcraft goods. The proceeds go to Christian Aid.

This year, since it is Bank Holiday Monday, we are there from Thursday 21st – Monday 25th May, one day more than usual. We hope you will help again and we would also welcome new people. We need at least 2 people at a time in 2 hour stints from 10.00 am to 4.00 pm. That makes 6 or more people per day and so a minimum of 30 people over the 5 days!

PLEASE CAN YOU HELP? No previous experience necessary.

Please consider carefully and prayerfully whether you could spare a couple of hours (or more!!) to help. It is not onerous work and it is a good opportunity to meet both visitors to the Well Dressings and your fellow helpers from other churches or none.

We also need people to bake tray bakes and cakes for the stall that we can sell by the slice, not as whole cakes. **We sell between 200 and 300 slices per day!!** It would be helpful if cakes and tray bakes were not cut up in advance, then we can ensure consistency in size of portions.

After Easter there will be lists in the various churches for staffing the stall and for providing cakes. Please try and help this very worthwhile event.

Friday 22 – Monday 25 May 2020



As two friends walked the 8½ miles from Jerusalem to Emmaus they chatted together about what they had experienced in

Jerusalem. They meet another traveller who joins them on their journey and in their conversation. It's only when they get to Emmaus and invite their fellow traveller into their home that they realise it's Jesus. Once he has left, the two friends say, 'Didn't we feel on fire as he conversed with us on the road, as he opened up the Scriptures for us?'

I'm a big fan of Christian Festivals as they give us the opportunity to open ourselves to God, as the two friends did on the Emmaus Road, without all the pressures of being part of the local church. These pressures might include focusing on the roles we have, being distracted by other things or the expectations of others. Festivals take us away from these pressures and enable us to be more open to God.

Cliff Festival offers a weekend of Bible study, worship, preaching, music, food and (often) sunshine and aims to engage with people of all ages through a variety of venues, meeting and eating places, activities, seminars and shopping opportunities. A typical day looks like this:

This year the theme is Global Vision with the majority of Festival being led by our friends from Africa, America and Europe. Bible study will be led by Revd Shane Bishop, the Senior Pastor of Christ Church in Fairview Heights, Illinois where he has been in this role for 22 years, during which time the church has grown from a congregation of 200 to congregations of over 2,500.

There will also be music from Phillipa Hanna, Emmanuel Smith, Billy Jo and Tom Smith and the Soul Survivor Band. More bands and contributors will be announced on the CliffFest Facebook page so have a look!

Festival is reasonably priced with day tickets for adults £20, concessions £13, 16-18s £5 and under 16s are free. Parking is free and you can either buy food on site or bring your own. Tickets can be booked on line at www.cliffcollege.ac.uk/festival or pay on the day.

Last year Margaret and Ken Sharples came for the first time and they reflect on their experience below:

As one-time regular “Spring Harvest-ers”, we really appreciated Cliff Festival on our doorstep as an affordable alternative with no long distance to travel. The courage of Oscar Romero

An Archbishop was presiding at Mass when a hired gunman shot him in the back. That was 40 years ago this month. Archbishop Oscar Romero was the Roman Catholic primate of San Salvador, the capital of El Salvador: a small, populous country in South America with a history of political intrigue, violence and corruption.

The assassin, a professional hit man who has never been caught, was working for an extreme right-wing junta and its supporters, who felt threatened by Romero's sermons and his hugely popular radio broadcasts.

Oscar Romero was not a natural agitator. The emphasis of his ministry had been on personal holiness and he had been slow to draw attention to the unscrupulousness which pervaded his country, but when a socially active priest-friend was murdered, he felt he had to follow the same path. He highlighted the torture of prisoners, the censorship of the press, closure of schools and the plight of the poor.

In 1980 he criticised the United States for their support of the junta. In a sermon on 23rd March 1980 he ordered the army to stop killing people: "In the name of God, and in the name of this suffering people whose cries rise to heaven more loudly each day, I beg you, I implore you, I order you, in the name of God, stop the repression!" That was his death warrant.

The next evening, at Mass in a hospital chapel, Romero had finished his sermon and moved to the altar when a car stopped outside the open door. A gunman got out, aimed his rifle and fired. Romero died instantly. He had said, "As a Christian I do not believe in death without resurrection. If they kill me, I shall arise in the Salvadoran people."

Oscar Romero is commemorated as one of 10 Christian martyrs whose statues adorn the West front of Westminster Abbey. The day of his martyrdom, 24th March, is remembered annually in the Anglican Lectionary, and by the United Nations because of its significance for human rights. In 1997, the Roman Catholic Church made him a Saint.

Did Oscar Romero mix religion with politics? He said, "I want to reaffirm that my sermons are not political. Naturally, they touch on politics, and they touch on the reality of the people, but their aim is to shed light and to tell you what it is that God wants."
