

Forced rest because of illness, bereavement, redundancy or retirement is challenging. Perhaps in that rest we start to lose who we are because of the circumstances surrounding us. Yet, it is in resting in God that we can find who we truly are, the children of God.

I hope and pray that as Holy Week and Easter approach, you will have opportunities to be still, rest, and know God.

## Supporting Christian Aid with friends from other churches

Christian Aid is a charity that works with local partners and communities to fight injustice, respond to humanitarian emergencies, campaign for change, and help people claim the services and rights they are entitled to.

For many years, Christians from Ashbourne's churches have joined together to 'give, act, pray' with Christian Aid during Christian Aid Week and during the Tissington Well Dressings. Our Christian Aid Week collection and Tissington Well Dressings are organised as part of Ashbourne Churches Together, and we get lots of support – so you'll be in good company if you join in!

Here's how you can get involved:

- Can you pray for the work of Christian Aid? We ask for your prayers for our local fundraising, and for the work of Christian Aid as they support the most vulnerable people and campaign for a fairer world. <u>Christian Aid Week Collections</u>
- Can you help to deliver donation envelopes to the houses of Ashbourne during Christian Aid week which is 12<sup>th</sup> – 18<sup>th</sup> May. We aim to deliver an envelope to every house this year, including the new estates, to enable everyone to give if they would like to.
- Can you offer your letterbox as a drop-off point for envelopes? You'll get a small poster to display by your front door, and we'll put a sticker on each envelope to tell people where their local drop-off point is. We aim to have one letterbox for every small area. We'll collect the envelopes from you at the end of the week for counting. If you live in a village and would like to deliver around your village, please let us know. <u>Cake Stall at Tissington Well Dressings</u>
- Can you bake something for the cake stall at Tissington Well Dressings. This is from 9<sup>th</sup> -12<sup>th</sup> May. We normally sell over 800 pieces of cake over the four day period, so we need lots of bakers! Please let us know what day you can bake for and how many portions, and we'll let you know the drop-off location in Ashbourne.
- Can you help to sell the cakes in Tissington? We have slots available between 10am and 4pm on each of the 4 days. It's a lovely event and before/after you might like to walk around the village and see the wells.

Last year, we raised a grand total of **£3495.90** for Christian Aid, from Christian Aid Week donations and the Tissington Cake Stall. Will you help us this year, as we support the work of Christian Aid around the world.

We are pleased to see all our regulars back, both individuals and a groups – including Spanish lessons, chess club, gatherings after sport at the leisure centre, gatherings after church groups as well as those joining us for afternoon teas and birthday parties. We have also been pleased to host St Oswald's Breakfast Church.

It was good to get back to our monthly Supper Club, with a Valentine special in February and an Italian evening in March. Look out for details of Supper Clubs in the next few months.

Shrovetide was busy, with many people joining us for breakfast, On the Wednesday were mentioned on Derbyshire Live when they suddenly realised the ball was on Church Street and rumours abounded that it was outside Cornerstone – within seconds the streets outside were packed – but the ball was nowhere to be seen!

### Looking to the future: being salt and light

We meet as a house group on alternate Tuesday afternoons and have been following a Lent study. We were looking at the Bible passage Matthew 5: 1-16 and in particular the verses headed 'Salt and Light' (13-16), thinking about how we can be salt and light in our church and community in Ashbourne.

Here are some comments from our group members-

'Light can be seen over considerable distance. The Church magazine can reach out to visitors picking up a copy. Having reflected on this, it is also on the website, reaching even further.'

'My thought is of a different sort of light; that by being active in the community in a positive way, demonstrating our faith, will lead to questions. These conversations as we give answers, will provide openings to spread the good news.'

'Salt over the centuries has been vital as a way of preserving food, especially for the winters; also, as a way of enhancing flavours. For us, as we preserve our Christian faith, we can always seek new ways to enhance how we put it into practice. The Community Hub will provide new opportunities to do this and give light to people in different ways.'

'When we had the eclipse, we went to Start Point to watch, with hundreds of other people, watching the sea. It was amazing. Birds flew home to roost; animals went quiet as darkness came. A great shout went up when the sun reappeared. A wonderful experience. The stars came out, their light coming from across the universe to us. Light is very important to us all.

"This little light of mine. Let it shine. Let it shine. You in your small corner and I in mine."

'The definition of a person who is 'the salt of the earth' – historically the purpose of salt was as a preservative, so someone who is the salt of the earth is 'someone who helps to stop the world going bad'.'

'We are called to bring light to this World. But we don't need to be a bright light, like a lighthouse, every day of our lives, as even the dim light of a candle creates light in the darkness. So, like a candle, even a small act of kindness can bring comfort and hope to someone who feels in a dark place.'

'There are lots of things happening in Ashbourne church now which show light to others:

Craft'n'Chat - support and friendship for people of all denominations and none

Afternoon Tea Service: "Easier to invite friends to this service, rather than the morning one" "my friend said they would come again if there was coffee cake!"

Work with children and young people: Welly Club, Muddy Church. Mustard, Open the Book, Advent activities. Using our prominent position in town to engage with the community: yarn bombing, Link display boards

Offering hospitality: Friendship lunch, Christmas Day meal, the Gateway Centre.'

As a group, we look forward to continuing and developing these activities in our new Link building and pray that we will find new and exciting opportunities to share the love of Christ with our community and to be 'salt and light'.

## I T Matters

Windows 10 will be coming to its end of life support in October 2025, There are a number of people who will have a computer (PC or laptop) that is running Window 10 and cannot be updated to Windows 11. They will probably be thinking about getting a new machine sometime soon. Many will have a newer model that is either running Windows 11 or capable of being easily upgraded.

The tricky point here is that Microsoft will soon be releasing Windows 12, possibly later this year but probably no later than spring 2025. To make the situation more complicated, it is rumoured that Windows 12 will need computers with at least 16GB of RAM (memory) in order to work with Microsoft's new AI companion called "copilot". This means many newer computers will not be able to be upgraded to Windows 12 should their owners wish to. At best they will need extra RAM modules installed. Confused? So you should be.

The good news is that Windows 11 should be supported by Microsoft until around 2031. So if you have a machine running it or capable of upgrading then stick with it.

If, however, you have an older model, then wait until the release of Windows 12 is announced, to see what its operating requirements actually are, then decide whether to buy a new computer that will run Windows 12, or one that will just run Windows 11 and will probably be cheaper.

Life was much simpler when we just had pen, pencil and an abacus!

and the peace of the chapel and have the opportunity to take away literature which may be a help in daily living.


Volunteers are needed to help the Tissington congregation to provide a presence at the chapel and be ready to chat.


