#### **MISSION MATTERS**

I have just completed my first four months of getting to grips with my role as Mission Coordinator for the Circuit. My aim was quite simple. To talk to those who have been involved with supporting various overseas projects, so that I can understand what has happened

in the past and to explore their thoughts for the future.

When starting off, the one slight concern I had was, would all my meetings be focused on what can we do to raise more funds! It was enlightening for me to learn that fund raising was not near the top of the agenda of any of the meetings I had. I learnt that most of the work carried out in the past has been focused on building relationships and partnerships and how important the power of prayer means to the communities we have been supporting.

I would like to take the opportunity to share some of my notes from each of my meetings, with the aim of increasing the awareness of the projects to both long standing members and new members. My list has made up of projects I have been made aware of since taking on the role. If any members have been involved in other projects that I am not aware of, I do apologize I have not been in touch and I very much hope we can catch up in the future.

# ACT Patna Partnership, North India Contact; John & Liz Hurfurt

I believe this is one of our longest partnerships and started in 1998 when the Bishop of Patna came to Ashbourne. Since then, there have been many visits both from Ashbourne to Patna and Patna to Ashbourne. The focus of our support has been with the St John's school in Taljhari and St Luke's hospital in Hiranpur. Prior to the pandemic the ACT Patna Partnership was sponsoring vital hostel

accommodation for 100 girls so that they could attend school away from their local villages. At just £6.00 a month it shows how a small amount can make a life changing difference. Since the Pandemic news has been quiet from the Partnership due to problems with sending funds to India. But I've just been advised by John and Liz a solution has been found and so over the coming months we should be able to report on some exciting updates. They have asked me to mention that although they are more than happy to continue as the main contacts, some new faces and support on the committee would be most welcome. So please let me know if getting involved in this project is of interest to you.

# Mambabu, Sierra Leone Contact; David and Judith Bale

Mambabu is a grass roots community development programme based in a remote area of Sierra Leone. It was set up 15 years ago in the aftermath of the civil war there to tackle conditions of extreme poverty and deprivation in a small rural community. It is a remarkable story of self-help community development and people in the Ashbourne Methodist Circuit have played an important role in supporting the programme from the early days. The programme coordinator in Sierra Leone, Matthew Bockarie, worshipped with us in Ashbourne several times during 2007/8, when the foundations of Mambabu were laid down. Look out for an article in the June issue of Connections - 'Mambabu - the first 15 years.' It is amazing what has been achieved!

# Phakamisa, Pinetown Methodist Church, South Africa Contact; Anne Wills

From the files I inherited I can see our relationship and support for Phakamisa goes back well over 10 years and was coordinated by an East Midlands Committee. Phakamisa was founded to serve and uplift impoverished communities through the provision of preschool education, together with education, resourcing and support of grandmothers and other family members. Since the pandemic there has been less activity due to various reasons. Our current Circuit contact, Anne Wills wants to stand down and so I am interested to hear from anyone would might be interested in becoming our contact for this mission project.

# Friends of CRS, Kolkata, India Contact; Joy Mallard

Cathedral Relief Service (CRS) work is focused on the city slums in Kolkata and the rural villages in the surrounding districts. Their mission is to provide education, health care and empowerment to women and children of all faiths. Our relationship with CRS started in 2015 when Joy and Ruth Mallard visited Kolkata. This was the same year John and Liz Hurfurt and Richard and Joyce Odell visited other parts of India, so I can only imagine all the planning that was involved! Over the years Joy has visited five times. Listening to her talk about her visits it's easy to understand the impact these visits have on the

organization, knowing the support and prayers they are receiving from the other side of the world.

# Jonathan and Isabel Hill, Zimbabwe Contact; Vacant

The Circuit's relationship and support for Jonathan and Isabel goes back many years and since they became mission partners in Zimbabwe. At the end of last year we heard that they had retired as mission partners and were back in Staffordshire with Jonathan's mother for three months. In March Joyce heard from them back in Zimbabwe and they are carrying out much of their previous work at the Hillside Methodist Church in the Bulawayo District. Hopefully we will receive more news over the coming months. As Richard has now stood down I would like to hear from anyone who would be interested in becoming the main contact for this long standing relationship.

# Mbungoni Methodist Church, Kenya Contact; Rachel Murt

At the beginning of the year I had the pleasure of reading Sister Merle's book, "From Kniveton to Kenya." It's an inspiring story and copies of the book are still available from John Dyster. It was only after reading the book that I learnt Rachel had visited the same part of Kenya in 20\*\* and since then her and a small group have been involved with various projects with the M'Bungoni Methodist Church, including most recently members of the Circuit supported the building of a new toilet block. In a recent report I read about how

the Church is aiming to grow their Junior Church Ministry (JCM) and Rachel is currently looking at ways to support this work.

Although this report is focused on various oversea's mission projects, in closing, it would be remiss of me not to mention the largest outreach and mission project the Circuit has ever undertaken, The Link Project. It's truly inspiring to witness the numerous teams of people working towards the completion of this project in the Spring of 2026.

Please hold in your prayers all the above projects and all those involved, as God leads them to carry out his purpose.

#### **Christian Aid**

Christian Aid is a charity that works with local partners and communities to fight injustice, respond to humanitarian emergencies, campaign for change, and help people claim the services and rights they are entitled to.



Christian Aid Week is the UK's longest-running fundraising week, having been held every year since 1957. It's a special time when we come together to fight extreme poverty. This year the focus is on Guatemala, where the climate crisis is intensifying, harvests are failing, and families relying on their own farms to supply their daily food are hit hardest. Aurelia

says "Climate change is getting worse every day. It's killing our plantations and it's killing us".

# But there is hope!

Aurelia joined the Christian Aid training programme and gained the skills and knowledge to cultivate native seeds that are better suited to the changing climate. She's producing her own organic fertiliser, creating nurseries, constructing rainwater collection systems, and making nutritious food and medicine for her chickens.

Thanks to Aurelia's ever-growing knowledge base, she's now cultivating cacao, sugarcane, cinnamon, corn and pineapples. It's steady progress that holds promise. Aurelia's resolute hope has also inspired her to develop and lead other activities in her community, including producing chocolate, establishing a farmers' market, and fighting for women's rights.

# Supporting Christian Aid with friends from other churches

For many years, Christians from Ashbourne's churches have joined together to 'give, act, pray' with Christian Aid during Christian Aid Week and during the Tissington Well Dressings.

Our Christian Aid Week collection and Tissington Well Dressings are organised as part of Ashbourne Churches Together, and we get lots of support – so you'll be in good company if you join in!

Here's how you can get involved:

 Can you pray for the work of Christian Aid? We ask for your prayers for our local fundraising, and for the work of Christian Aid as they support the most vulnerable people and campaign for a fairer world.

#### Christian Aid Week Collections

- Can you help to deliver donation envelopes to the houses of Ashbourne during Christian Aid week which is 11<sup>th</sup> – 17<sup>th</sup> May. We aim to deliver an envelope to every house this year, including the new estates, to enable everyone to give if they would like to.
- Can you offer your letterbox as a drop-off point for envelopes? You'll get a small poster to display by your front door, and we'll put a sticker on each envelope to tell people where their local drop-off point is. We aim to have one letterbox for every small area. We'll collect the envelopes from you at the end of the week for counting. If you live in a village and would like to deliver around your village, please let us know.
- During Christian Aid Week in 2024, we raised £2126.56.


