As autumn becomes more real to us may we continue to give thanks for all that we have been blessed with, continue to give to those in need, and share faith, hope and love with all whom we meet on our journey through life.

Challenges along the cut

Holidays for David and I mean taking our 36' narrowboat (Jack in a Box') travelling on the canal system, exploring and enjoying time away. So planning for our 2025 adventures started by making sure Jack was de-winterised, that she was re-stocked with food/fuel and ready to depart to be away as long as possible.

The glorious weather this year meant that water levels became very low leading to stretches of canal, lock flights and tunnels being shut or on restricted opening. We are lucky in that mooring at Willington means that the canal here is fed by rivers that generally keep levels OK. However, as we wanted to travel north to Stoke on Trent, we waited until September for some rain so that we could navigate safely, eventually setting sail in mid-September for 2 weeks away.

Now our boat is small (a ½ length boat) and the 2 of us set sail with our beagle and a large greyhound (very cosy). It is also basic (a bit like camping) with the need to make best use of the facilities provided bankside for water collection, rubbish and Elsen toilet disposal. Also we need to consider safe food storage (a cool box that plugs in whilst travelling) and keeping warm (using our on-board log burner in cooler nights and mornings).

We plan ahead between water points and food shops, so travelled slowly at first reaching the 'Plume of Feathers' pub at Barlestone on the Saturday. Stopping for a refreshing drink we were disappointed to find out that one of our favourite watering holes was closing for refurbishment for 10 days on the Monday. As we had a full water tank and there is a small supermarket near the pub we decided to stay for 2 nights then go north on Monday.

However on Sunday we heard an ominous sound as the water pump decided it had lived a full life and packed up. This meant that despite a full water tank we were unable to get any water out of the taps and became reliant on our 10 litre emergency water carrier we have on board. The pub landlord was a star and refilled our water carrier late Sunday evening, then once shut from Monday arranged for the workmen to refill again for us. "I would not want to see anyone without water" he said.

We made the decision to turn round (so never made it to Stoke this year). Initially we survived on 5-6 litres of water a day for all our drinks, food cooking, washing up and doing teeth. We discovered many ways of using the least water possible – everything from wiping dirty food plates before washing in 1" of hot soapy water to recycling used water, measuring carefully and not spilling a drop. We also bought another water carrier in Rugeley and bottles of drinking water as we went along.

Thoughts and prayers Lord ...

Thank you for clean, fresh water.

Thank you for the pub landlord who helped us by giving us water when we needed it.

Thank you for teaching me that it is possible to manage on less resources than our sheltered lives provide us with, help us to value what we have and use it wisely.

We think and pray for those in the world who survive with much less water per day than we did.

We think and pray for those in parts of the world where food and water is scarce or where floods and natural disasters have devastated communities.

Finally - we arrived back in the marina having managed for a whole week without water out of taps - so David's next job is to replace the water pump ready for what we hope will be a slightly longer trip in 2026.

LINK Construction Update - September/October 2025



The Link Foyer roof is in place, and we can see the stairs up to the balcony and the upper ground floor level. Also the stairs down to the lower ground floor and the whole flight up to the balcony level

The Link Foyer is really starting to take shape with the erection of the steelwork and the installing of the ground level floor. (This picture was taken a couple of weeks ago, before the scaffolding went up)











Our Link Operations Manager is carefully ensuring that everything is as it should be!

In Cornerstone the opening into the Link Foyer is made together with the opening for the new servery and the accessible WC. The spaces for the new Cornerstone kitchen and servery area are created. The old door and servery are blocked up.





In Gateway Lodge the walls are plastered, and all the plumbing and electrical cables are in place ready for the ceilings to be installed









The walls for the new Garden Entrance to Gateway Lodge and the lower ground floor of the Link Centre are being built.

In the garden a large pit has been dug to take the attenuation tank for the water run-off from our buildings (once in place the tank will be buried)

Unschooled Ordinary Men

On the evening of Saturday 11 October, men of all ages and from different local Churches gathered at Elim Church for an inspiring and sometimes very moving evening organized by Christian Vision for Men (CVM).

Why the name for the evening? I think most of us there could think of reasons or excuses why we don't share the good news with our friends, neighbours, work colleagues and the list goes on. Nathan, head of CVM, started the evening by reading Acts 4; 12 -13.

"Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved." When they saw the courage of Peter and John and realized that they were unschooled, ordinary men, they were astonished and they took note that these men had been with Jesus.

CVM have been on the road most of this year visiting Churches up and down the country with a powerful vision and message that like Peter, who when chosen by Jesus had no obvious qualities to be a leader of men, we can make a personal difference in this world.

The main talk of the evening was by Gasky, and ex CID Policeman. Gasky, had been in UK policing for 35 years, from vice squad to terror. Following the death of a close work colleague, Gasky shared how his life spiralled out of control and the impact on his mental health, home and family and then how his life unexpectantly dramatically changed.

The evening also included a time of fellowship with music lead by Elim Church and prayers lead by Nathan.
